

UCCS Economic Forum Dashboard Report September 2024

Greetings and happy fall from Dwire Hall at UCCS!

This month brought the Census Bureau's release of results from the 2023 American Community Survey. This is the source of data for our "Selected Population Characteristics" table on page 4 of the dashboard. That table reports figures for El Paso County, but the data are also available at the metro area level. This year's release confirms our status as one of the country's more affluent metro areas. Median household income in the Pikes Peak Region (i.e., the Colorado Springs Metropolitan Statistical Area, which includes El Paso and Teller Counties) was \$89,792 in 2023, ranking 48th out of 387 metro areas. That is up from \$81,912 in 2022. Adjusting for inflation using the CPI (4.9% increase from 2022 to 2023), gives a very healthy increase of 4.7% in real median household income. Nationally, median household income in 2023 was \$77,719, and, for Colorado, \$92,911 (9th among US States). It is worth keeping in mind that, like many of the series we track, this data is from surveys and subject to sampling error.

The ACS includes many other indicators. Among other things, it tells us that the region's poverty rate, at 7.1%, is considerably lower than the national rate of 12.5%. Average commute times in the region are slightly below the national average (24.1 versus 26.8 minutes). Homeownership rates are a little higher here than nationwide -67.3% of local housing units are owner-occupied, versus 65.2% nationally.

This data also highlights the importance of the military and veterans in the region. The region ranks 12th for the share of people 16 and over in the armed forces, and 11th for the proportion of veterans in the civilian population 18 and over (Jacksonville NC, home of Camp Lejuene, is the highest in both). Among metro areas with over 500,000 people, the Pikes Peak Region is second only to Killeen-Temple TX (Fort Cavazos) for the shares of military and veterans.

Local employment indicators came in weak for August. The Bureau of Labor Statistics' preliminary estimate of civilian nonfarm payrolls gave a decrease of 100, and the July increase was revised down from 1100 to 700. That is from their survey of business establishments. The household survey data was also lackluster - the unemployment rate is up to 4.5%, with the number of people employed declining by nearly 2000. The household survey data for August is not seasonally adjusted, but August is not typically a month that sees a decline in employment (note: the seasonally adjusted local data in the figure on p. 1 is reported with a time lag and the adjusted August estimate is not available yet).

After a slight dip last month, year-on-year Colorado Springs City Sales and Use Tax Collections were up 3.3% for July sales. Year-to-date collections are up 2.3%.

Home sales continued to be sluggish, despite an elevated number of homes on the market. August home sales were down slightly (-0.3%) compared with last year, while the number of active listings

was up 37.2% over a year ago. I'm still waiting to see evidence of reduced mortgage rates getting more buyers into the market (note: the dashboard reports a monthly average for August, Freddie Mac's weekly average 30-year mortgage rate reported on Sep. 19 was 6.09%). The median sale price ticked down to \$490,000, after being at \$499,000 in May-July.

The 2024 annual point-in-time count conducted by the Pikes Peak Continuum of Care showed a decrease in the number of people experiencing homelessness to 1146, of whom 259 were unsheltered. That is down from 1302 (374 unsheltered) last year. These counts are conducted on a single night in January.

City Lodgers and Auto Rental Tax (LART) collections for both June and July transactions were slightly down over last year (-6.4% and -1.2%, respectively), but that follows some strong months earlier in the year. Year-to-date collections are up 2.6%. Enplanements at COS were up 8.5% in July compared with a year ago.

Statewide, payrolls increased by a healthy 7400 in August, according to the preliminary estimate, but July's gain was revised down significantly, from 4800 to 800. The state unemployment rate ticked up from 3.9% to 4.0%, but this was due to an increase in job-seekers, not a decline in the number of people working.

Nationally, the August employment report showed a solid payroll gain of 142,000, though the June and July increases were revised downward. The US unemployment rate decreased from 4.3% to 4.2%. The share of persons aged 25-54 who were employed remained at 80.9%, slightly above its pre-pandemic level. Although the totals look healthy, there are other signs of the labor market continuing to weaken, such as an increase in the number of people who were working part-time for "economic reasons" – i.e., people who wanted more hours but couldn't get them.

The Fed's announcement of a 0.5% reduction in the target range for the federal funds rate got headlines, and the uncertainty about whether the move would be 0.25% or 0.5% gave this meeting a little more drama than most. However, while this is an important milestone, the beginning of the Fed's move towards a more "neutral" policy setting has been well anticipated, so long-term interest rates, which reflect *expectations* of short-term rates, did not move much and actually increased slightly. I was pleased to see the Fed go for the larger cut, though I still wish it had come sooner.

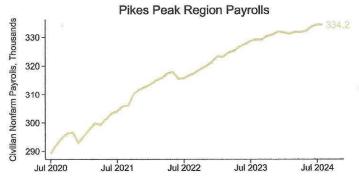

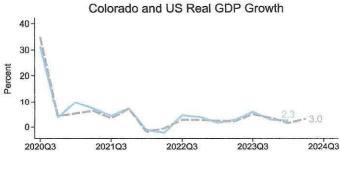

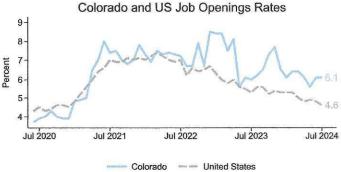

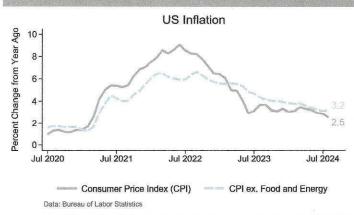

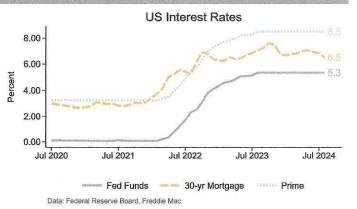

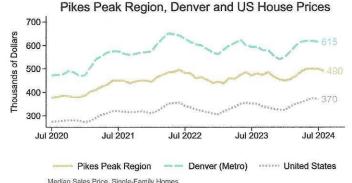

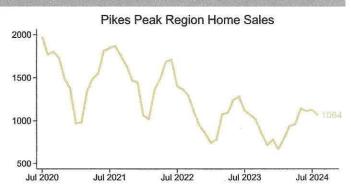

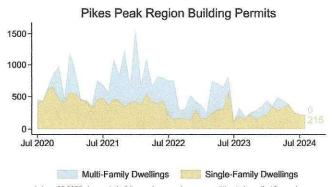
Pikes Peak Region Commercial Vacancy Rates

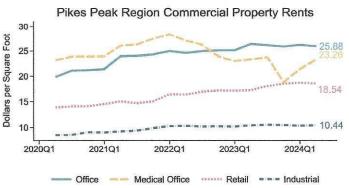

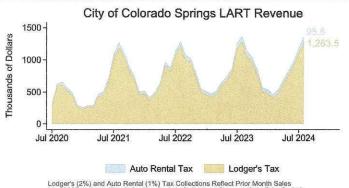
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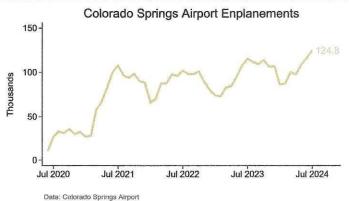

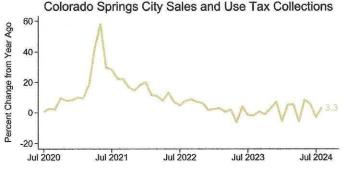

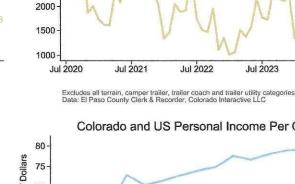
